In Other News

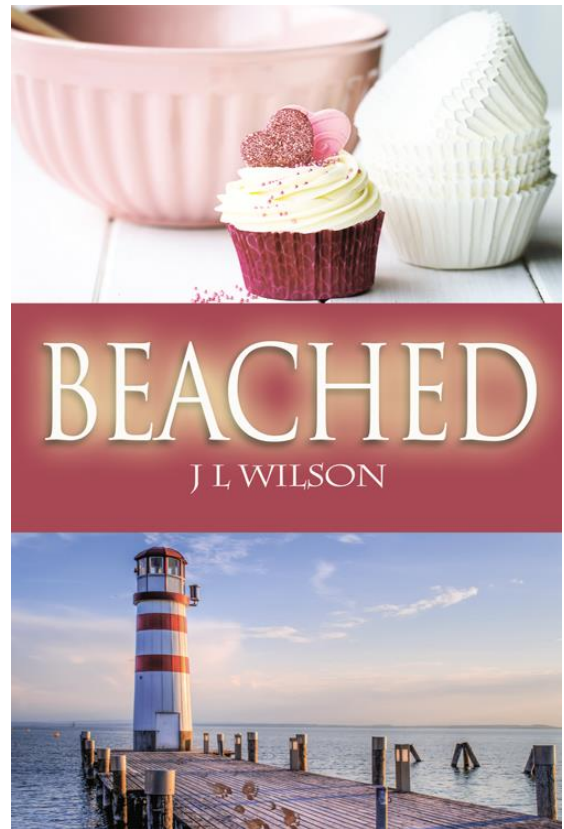

I've read and re-read these manuscripts several times but I'm *still* finding typos and errors I want to fix. That's the beauty of this system. It's like having the printed page in front of me to review a manuscript, but I'm not printing out reams of papers to do it. I always find more things to change when I print a book, but I sure hate wasting the ink and paper. This means I can avoid that process and still be able to get a good review done.

I also want to start working on the covers for this series. I have a 3-book group (the Celestial Service books), then the 9-book series (the Endless American Dream), then the 2-book group (the next generation) then the final 3-book group (the New Human series). I want them to be cohesive but different.

That's going to take some time -- and now I have the time to do it! Yay, me!
